<u>Watch</u>

I remember that beer drenched man.

Silence with a cricket's chirp turned to name calling rage upon my Mom.

To dog growling anger.

To ear piercing yells that can be heard throughout the house. To fist clenched violence that imprints hand-shaped bruises on her peach-skinned face.

He takes the lamp that gives light and throws it, shattering into hundreds of pieces giving darkness.

I could see the hammer of welding and fixing,

as it's steel head makes a hole in the wall bigger than my head.

Deep canyons of empty feelings.

I don't know what to do; I don't know what to make of it. It makes holes in my stomach bigger than the biggest whale and they that they cannot be repaired.

I have to resume responsibility.

Watching over my brothers as if I was their father.

Watching the violence as my mom's knees tremble and fall.

Watching as the woman who bore me was beaten like a filthy rug.

Watching the red teardrops fall from her purpled skin.

In shock, could this really happen, no, it must have been a dream.

Disgust at my Dad, the man in which I am supposed to look up to

Afraid of what he could do to me if I stood up to him. Shrieks of torture from the fallen and near death women. Paralyzed and traumatized of what I have been witnessed to for more than all my life.

She falls for the last time after 100 blows. She can never get back up and walk again. Always down, as if she had an incurable disease. Because of the man she said I do to 20 years ago.

I look away from the pain, stuffling it all inside like a volcano. I could not watch any longer for I will surely pass out or throw up.

I wish not to remember, but I must to do different to my family. I wish not to have seen, but it is too late, the damage is done.
